


Solera Market Update as of May 6, 2021




There you have it, three different styles of pizza and all are feel-good food.

ROAD TRIP

Star gazing and more in Tonopah

Stars are so plentiful above Tonopah, USA Today named it among "the top places to star gaze." But that's just one reason to visit the historic town midway between Las Vegas and Reno. With a mining museum and historic hotels, plus a strange cemetery and the International Car Forest, a funky yet innovative outdoor art display, en route, you'll find plenty to see and do on a weekend excursion.

Just 232 miles up US 95, the former silver mining town, where silver has once again been discovered, is an eye opener, for many reasons.

The day my friends and I traveled north, an unlikely squall warning (yes, squall) beeped our phones. With 40 mph winds taking the "feels like" temperature into the teens, and sleet bombarding our car, we still visited the Car Forest in Goldfield, just shy of Tonopah. We froze amidst the jaw-dropping current batch of art gracing half-buried jalopies and buses.

Before leaving Goldfield, we braved the wind in the most unusual cemetery I've ever seen. First, it has a great back story: Originally mid-town, it interfered with the coming railroad. So one night, the railroad company sent men to move it to the outskirts of Goldfield. They became known as the "Ghouls of the Night."

Secondly, it appeared to have wordless white crosses marking the graves. After a closer look, we found hand-inscribed stones (like you might lay on a patio) in front of the crosses. Even graves with tombstones had been hand-scribed, not engraved. We also found epitaphs, like one for an 18-year-old woman – "A child weary of her ways" and another that reads, "Unknown man died eating library paste." Note to self.

The continued weather and COVID closures in Tonopah limited what we could do next, but we still found ample entertainment in the "Queen of the Silver Camps." The least likely adventure was a soul-provoking drive through Tonopah's ghetto of abandoned homes, trash and tires, sprinkled with well-kept vinyl-sided bungalows. (To include a moment reflecting on how lucky we are to live in Solera.)

Our residence for the single night, to the contrary, was once tagged "The Jewel of the Desert." The Mizpah Hotel, mostly restored to its former grandeur, opened in 1907 as a luxury hotel in the midst of a booming mining town. It was restored in 1980 and again in 2011. We enjoyed a drink in the grand lobby beneath massive chandeliers, breakfast in the brightly lit restaurant, and tight quarters and comfortable bed in our circa 1900s room. We also enjoyed a tiny museum packed with interesting memorabilia as well as a few ghost



stories (though we didn't bump into the oft-sighted ghosts).

On warm weather trips, we've seen the Tonopah Mining Park, taken its walking tour, and enjoyed stepping back in history. (For more information about the park, go to tonopahminingpark.com). Another thing we skipped due to cold winds was star gazing! Unbelievably, not one of us was willing to brave the cold even with multiple layers and blankets (the 6027 foot elevation didn't help). It's especially surprising since on my last trip to Tonopah, I saw seven shooting stars!

If you're lucky enough to have a clear night, go to Tonopah's Clair Blackburn Memorial Stargazing Park at the end of Ray Tennant Drive. You can sit at a picnic table and set up your telescope on a cement pad. But don't worry; there's plenty to see without one.

Our last two adventures were afterthoughts. First, car dealer Jim Marsh is an avid collector of signs and historical oddities. Many grace the lobby and restaurant in his Tonopah Station Hotel Casino.

Second, as we drove home, we stopped for lunch at the Sourdough Saloon in Beatty. Don't look for any Michelin stars, but it was a fun place with good food and friendly service. Before we left we stapled our signed dollar to the wall. Be sure to hunt for it among the hundreds already there!

Hollywood history and 'Pot Town USA'

If you are ruthless enough, you might escape from jail or, if you are clever enough to solve the clues, you might open the exit door to flee an escape room, a popular pre-pandemic social activity.

But there's another kind of escape, an escape to, and two very differ-ent sort of such places are located near each other and only about 40 miles south of Solera.

Head toward Boulder City through Railroad Pass and take US 95 south to Searchlight. There, in addition to paying very close attention to the speed limit, turn right on Nevada 164 and take the arrow-straight 2-lane pavement west through the Joshua Tree forest to the turn off for Walking Box Ranch.

Walking Box Ranch was established in 1931 as a retirement home and an escape from the bright lights by married Hollywood stars Clara Bow and Rex Bell. They hosted the likes of Clark Gable, Carole Lombard, Errol Flynn, John Wayne and a young actor named Clint Eastwood at the ranch's buildings. The "walking box" was the working ranch's cattle brand, a box camera on a tripod.

The ranch is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, is owned by the Bureau of Land Management and co-managed with UNLV. According to the BLM website, tours of the facility are available once a month. They have not been offered in recent months. However, a communication from the BLM indicates that the tours may be resuming after the hot summer months. Returning to Nevada 164 and continuing west 15 miles you pass into California as you descend into the Ivanpah Valley and arrive at another place of escape, the community of Nipton.

Founded as Nippeno Camp at the crossroads of two wagon trails, the town of Nipton — with a trading post and hotel — emerged to serve area cattle ranches and mining operations after the arrival of the San Pedro, Los Angeles and Salt Lake Railroad in the first decade of the 20th century.

Fast forward to 2017 and the 80 acres of Nipton were purchased by American Green, a company that saw the site just off I-15 as the location for "Pot Town, USA," a cannabis-based tourist attraction. That plan fell through; the

site became privately owned and in 2020 was listed for sale – the asking price is nearly \$3 million.

Though "no trespassing" signs are everywhere, you can walk along the roadway and railroad track and see much of what remains (and sometimes, I'm told, one of the few local residents might offer a quick tour. The day I visited though, I saw no one other than a couple of tourists from San Diego who also were walking around and seeing what they could).

What there is to see are the old but closed-up hotel and restaurant and other buildings, several public works of art, including some from the annual Burning Man gathering, and apparently the local desert tortoises (we saw lettuce someone had left out as feed for the native reptiles).

And if you really like what you see in Nipton, for a few million, you can make it your personal escape.

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
