With the cup and two spoons in hand, walk to the tables by the windows. Sit, chat, and savor the icy treat, the air conditioning, and the elegance.








Flagstaff Is Cool All Around

Once home to Sinagua, Cohonina and Ancestral Pueblo peoples, the greater Flagstaff area teams with activities from the renowned Lowell Observatory to national monuments preserving Native American residential sites. At 7,000 feet elevation and surrounded by the world's largest contiguous pondersa pine forest, Flagstaff provides nearby escape to cooler temps during the summer.

Flagstaff's historic and pedestrian-friendly downtown along old Route 66 is a quirky mix of commissioned murals painted over old brick facades, intriguing eateries and breweries, and boutique shops and galleries.

Lowell Observatory, a short distance west of downtown, offers socially distanced guided tours and premium access for private stargazing option. Reservations required for both, with masks worn indoors at all times.

The Arboretum is a beehive of activity offering wildflower and bird walks, yoga and painting classes, even early evening concerts, as well as hour-long. docent-led garden tours through October. The Arboretum is located 4 miles south on Woody Mountain Road. The first mile is paved, the remainder unpaved Forest Service road but suitable for all vehicles.

The Museum of Northern Arizona houses more than 5 million southwestern artifacts on Fort Valley Road (Highway 180) north of town. Admission tickets can be purchased online in 2-week increments. Fully vaccinated need not mask.

Looking for great outdoor action? Flagstaff is home to the Flagstaff Urban Trail System (FUTS) encompassing around 50 miles throughout the city and on all sides of town. Hike, bike and even ride horses, with some trails wheelchair and stroller accessible.

A cherished example of crafted architecture featuring a rustic exterior of log-slab siding, volcanic stone arches and hand-split wooden shingles, the Riordan Mansion is not to be missed. Built in 1904 during Flagstaff's early lumber days, the expansive home has 40 rooms and more than 13,000 square feet of living area. The Mansion's interior is seen by guided tour only, and reservations are recommended (see AZ State Parks website).

Head northeast of downtown on Route 66 and connect with Highway 89 leads to get to Sunset Crater volcano park, and beyond that to Wupatki National Monument. Latter provides Visitor Center services and trail info to the various pueblo sites.

Heading east on I-40 for 20 minutes brings one to Walnut Canyon National Monument – an ancient cliff-dwelling community. The Island trail is 1-mile long with 25 cliff dwelling rooms visible across the canyon.

At time of writing (late June), Coconino County was in Phase 2 of reopening so no events larger than 250 attendants were allowed. Flagstaff hotels are in high demand from Grand Canyon visitors so make reservations. Also check www.flagstaffarizona.org for potential wildfire closures.



Escape reality at an escape room

You don't have to travel all the way to the beach or the mountains if you seek an escape. Consider one of the many escape rooms that are available in the Las Vegas Valley.

What's an escape room, you ask?

An escape room is a group puzzle-solving game in which the players find clues, solve puzzles and sometimes undertake challenges as they seek to escape from a room (or series of rooms) within a time limit.

The escape room phenomenon is believed to have started with video games but then escalated into actually physical rooms where people pay to play. Usually, escape rooms have themes, and those can range from simulating a jail break to being spies, outer-space explorers, a locked library or even a holiday theme.

As you might expect, the top-rated escape rooms in the Las Vegas area are located on or near The Strip. According to Yelp.com, they are:

- Escapology Escape Rooms Las Vegas, which actually is off the Strip at 2797 S. Maryland Parkway and offers a variety of rooms, including a submarine, murder mansion, art museum, the Budapest Espress, and even one with a Scooby-Doo adventure theme.
- Number One Escape Room, 1775
 Tropicana, Suite 100, featuring among other things a cabin in the woods.

- Rush To Escape, 953 E. Sahara Ave, Suite A-17, with Prison Break, Ultimate Heist and Smite Sherlock escapes.
- The Basement A Live Escape Room Experience, 3440 Polaris Ave., which says on its website it's part escape room, part haunted house.

There are many others, at least one of which we figure we should mention. Again, the one is off the Strip, at 5067 Arville St. (near The Orleans). It's Once Upon An Escape, which offers what are considered family style, fairytale-based, perhaps even Disneyinspired escape adventures.



Escape the room via Alexa


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

There's Nothing Like a Mountaintop

As if having to expose your body to the sun and to other beach goers isn't enough, there's the awful smell of the tanning lotion you have to slather on, and then there's the sand that somehow finds its way into everything, even after you leave and discover how much of it you've tracked back into your car.

Ah, a day at the beach, but watch out for the algae bloom or an infestation of stinging jellyfish, and what's that fin I see skimming along the surface?

OK, watching sunset on the beach can be a great experience, but it involveS a few minutes, not all day, and if we're contemplating an escape from the triple-digit temperatures, which we are this month in the Solera Star, the obvious place to escape is to the mountains.

There's a reason why some mountains are snow-capped year around. It's because it's cooler up there than it is down here.

So why is it cooler in the mountains? We checked with Dr. Universe, resident know-it-all at Washington State University. The good doctor turned to Shelly Pressley, an environmental engineer in the WSU Laboratory for Atmospheric Research and learned about the Earth's atmosphere and gravity and the gas molecules that comprise the air we breathe.

"Maybe you've heard people say the air is thinner up in the mountains," the doctor notes, explaining that there is less air pressure as elevation increases, and "where there is less pressure and the molecules or building blocks are more spread out. When the pressure of a gas decreases, so does temperature." So, if you want to escape the heat, you need to head to the mountains.

But there's more to mountains than cooler temperatures. There are the views,. Remember, it was looking upon the vistas she could see from Pikes Peak that Katherine Lee Bates wrote of amber waves of grain and purple mountains majesties.

It also was mountains that inspired John Denver to sing about how "the shadows from the starlight are softer than a lullaby."

Even if the weather suddenly turns too cold, the mountains may reveal things you won't find on the beach. As a child visiting grandparents in Montana, a sudden summer snow squall in a mountain pass forced us to spend some time to enjoy lunch in an amazing log-built restaurant. Years later, as an adult driving in Wyoming, a late-summer storm forced me to take shelter in a ranger station, where I was greeted with a fresh cup of coffee and a private and fascinating lesson about the Native American medicine wheel that was quickly disappearing beneath the falling snow.

Notice that in Pamela's story about the glories of the beach, the Beach Boys' song she quotes suggests you can "catch a wave and you're on top of the world."

Nice thought. But when you are cooling off and enjoying the vista from the mountain top, you truly, literally, are "on top of the world."

Mount Charleston: Only 75 miles away and 25 degrees cooler

To the Southern Paiutes, it was Nuvagantu, meaning "where the snow is." To residents of the Las Vegas Valley, it is Mount Charleston, where you can ski in the winter and in summer months a nearby place to escape the triple-digit temperatures.

Rising to an elevation of 11,916 feet, Mount Charleston is the tallest peak in the Spring Mountains range and the eighth highest in the state of Nevada. With its separation from other tall peaks, it is rated among the eight "most prominent" mountains in the continental United States.

Though known to native peoples as the place of snow, the name Charleston was applied in 1869 by a member of the US Army Corps of Engineers to honor of his hometown, the South Carolina seaport city.

Did you know?

- · What we commonly refer to as Mount Charleston is actually part of the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area, in the Humboldt-Tolyabe National Forest.
- · Mount Charleston rises up from the Mojave Desert as a sky island that provides a forested and spring-fed haven for wildlife, including more than 25 endemic plant and animal species, as well being an alpine retreat for human visitors and a few hundred human residents.
- The Spring Mountains Visitors Gateway spans 90 acres and includes (when it's open; it's been closed due to the pandemic) a visitors center, education building, picnic areas, two amphitheaters, various trailheads and benches with views of Kyle Canyon and Charleston Peak.
- The Seven Stone Plaza at the Gateway honors the seven Paiute tribes that consider the mountain a sacred place.
- The Gateway also includes the first Cold War Memorial in the United States.



- "Mount Charleston" is the general reference to two separate locations, Kyle Canyon on the southern side and Lee Canyon on the northern side. Access to the mountain is from U.S. 95 via either Nevada 157 (Kyle Canyon Road) or Nevada 156 (Lee Canyon Road). Linking those two roads is Nevada 158, which offers scenic vistas from its elevated location on the east side of the mountain.
- Kyle Canyon is a larger community that includes the Mount Charleston Lodge, a popular dining spot. The original lodge was built after World War II but was burned in a fire in 1961 and was rebuilt by its owners, who also owned the Hacienda resort in Las Vegas.
- · Lee Canyon is a recreation area with a ski and snowboard resort, camping, hiking trails, etc. During the summer months, the resort offers rides on its chairlifts and other activities to visitors.

IMPORTANT NOTE for those (especially those of a certain age) who opt to ride the chair lift in summer months:

During the winter, you ski off the lift, but in the summer the process is to run off the chair and down the hill. I tried. I failed. Fortunately there was wood-chip mulch to cushion the fall. I learned, however, that you can ask the lift attendant to stop the lift so you can walk away safely.

Ask and be safe.



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
