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

The holidays are behind us, and we look forward to the new year. January passed quickly. Friends and family members who traveled from colder climates to spend the holidays with you may be returning to enjoy our more mild weather.

Over this past holiday season, perhaps you and your quests enjoyed some time on our pickleball courts, in the gym doing cardio and/or strength training exercises, or maybe playing pool. Everyone had such a great memorable experience that you are planning to utilize the Community Center again.

But what a hassle! Well, not anymore. It used to mean going to the front desk to purchase a quest pass whenever you wanted to bring in a guest(s).

Guess what! That process has changed. Solera management listened to your suggestions and updated the Community Center Guest Pass Process.

Now, you can purchase a prepaid Guest Pass Punch Card for only \$2 per guest. You no longer have to pay when you bring a quest to our Community Center.

Guest Pass Punch Cards are single cards with ten punch holes, totaling \$20 per card. You can purchase one Guest Pass Punch Card at a time, allowing ten opportunities to utilize our Community Center with your guest(s).

Once you have your Punch Card, please bring it with you and your guests and merely check with the monitor at the front desk. The monitor will punch the card, matching the number of quests you have with you.

Remember to be present with your guest(s) when redeeming your Punch Card.

This new guest pass process is so easy, and you and your guests will look forward to spending additional time at our Community Center. See you there! *



SOLERA'S COMMITTEES AT WORK

ENHANCING COMMUNITY COMMUNICATIONS

BY THE COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

Editor's note: This is the first in a series of reports outlining the work of the various standing committees of the Solera at Anthem community.

Although Solera at Anthem was established in 2003, it wasn't until 2014 that the Board of Directors created what was then an ad hoc communications committee to write articles for the Solera Star. various brochures and to help celebrate community anniversaries. It would be another year before the *ad hoc* label was removed and Communications became an official Solera at Anthem standing committee.

In an updated resolution in 2020, the committee was charged with three responsibilities:

- Assist management in the development of articles appropriate for publication in the Association Magazine;
- Assist management and the Board of Directors in developing meaningful methods of communicating with homeowners:
- · Assist management in the maintenance of the community website.

Basically, the committee works with the lifestyle director and the assistant in producing the monthly Solera Star magazine, in maintaining the soleranews.com website, and in offering the twicea-week eBlast, to which you can subscribe through the link on the homepage of Solera's website.

As of the deadline for this issue. committee members are Marcia Adams, Laura Addi, Betty Boyd, Larry Edsall, Tom Gorman and Nadyne Sweetko, with Frank Nobel as the Board's liaison and Dominique Jordan-Qaraja as Solera's newly promoted Lifestyle Manager.


We also must note the work for the previous 2 1/2 years of former lifestyle director Sandi Anderson, who enabled the committee's efforts to enhance and expand the Star's content, to produce the 20th anniversary issue this past August, and to change the magazine's printer, a move that produced an annual savings to the association of more than \$21.000.



Another result was the first of a series of quarterly meetings where the chairs of the various Solera standing committees can discuss their committees' work and issues common with a goal of% enhancing life in Solera.

Solera residents have the opportunity to cast several votes in this year, including the U.S. Presidential Preference Primary this month, the June Primary, and the General Election in November.

Of immediate concern for residents of Solera at Anthem is the annual election of our Board of Directors. Your ballot and voting instructions are being mailed concurrent with this issue of the Solera Star. On the following pages you'll find the biographies submitted by the five candidates running for the four seats on the Board. To keep the proper election sequence for the 7-person board, the three candidates receiving the most votes will serve 2-year terms and the fourth highest candidate will serve a 1-year term.

You can vote for as many as four candidates on your ballot.

A "Meet the Candidates" forum took place on January 18 and a more informal open house with candidates occurred in the clubhouse on January 21.

In addition to the candidate pages that follow, each candidate's two-page nomination form is available for viewing on the resident portal on the Solera website.

Your ballot must be delivered to the Solera at Anthem clubhouse — by mail or you can drop it in the ballot box at the monitor's desk — by 4:00 p.m. on February 21.

If you wish, you can watch as the votes are opened and counted in the ballroom by a team of Solera residents who have volunteered to serve as ballot counters. That process begins at 4:00 p.m. The results of the election will be announced as soon as the tally is completed as part of the annual unit owners meeting, which is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. February 21.

Immediately afterward, the new Board of Directors will hold its organizational meeting to appoint officers and committee liaisons. 🛠

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FEBRUARY MILITARY HISTORY

BY THE SOLERA VETERANS AND FIRST RESPONDERS CLUB

Editor's note: The Solera Veterans and First Responders Club will not be meeting February 6 due to Presidential Primary voting taking place in the Stardust Room.

February 3, 1943 - An extraordinary act of heroism occurred in the icy waters off Greenland after the U.S. Army transport ship Dorchester was hit by a German torpedo and began to sink rapidly. When it became apparent there were not enough life jackets, four U.S. Army chaplains on board removed theirs, handed them to frightened young soldiers, and chose to go down with the ship while praying.

February 9, 1943 - During World War II in the Pacific, U.S. troops captured Guadalcanal in the Solomon Islands after six months of battle with 9,000 Japanese and 2,000 Americans killed.



February 10, 1942 - The first Medal of Honor during World War II was awarded (posthumously) to 2nd Lt. Alexander Nininger for heroism during the Battle of Bataan.

February 13, 1945 - During World War II in Europe, British and American planes began massive bombing raids on Dresden, Germany. A four-day firestorm erupted that was visible for 200 miles and engulfed the historic old city, killing an estimated 135,000 German civilians.

February 15, 1898 - In Havana, the U.S. Battleship Maine was blown up while at anchor and quickly sank with 260 crew members lost. The incident inflamed public opinion in the U.S., resulting in a declaration of war against Spain on April 25, 1898, amid cries of "Remember the Maine!"



February 17, 1865 - During the American Civil War, Fort Sumter in South Carolina was returned to the Union after nearly a year and a half under Confederate control. The fort had been the scene of the first shots of the war.

February 17, 1909 - Apache Chief Geronimo (1829-1909) died while in captivity at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He had led a small group of warriors on raids throughout Arizona and New Mexico. Caught once, he escaped. The U.S. Army then sent 5,000 men to recapture him.

February 19, 1945 - U.S. Marines made an amphibious landing on Iwo Jima.

February 20, 1943 - German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel broke through American lines at Kasserine Pass in North Africa as inexperienced U.S. Troops lost their first major battle of World War II in Europe, with 1,000 Americans killed.

February 23, 1942 - During World War II, the first attack on the U.S. mainland occurred as a Japanese submarine shelled an oil refinery near

Santa Barbara, California, causing minor damage.

February 23, 1942 - The flag raising on Mt. Suribachi (Iwo Jima) occurred in the early afternoon.

February 23, 1991 - In Desert Storm, the Allied ground offensive began after a devastating monthlong air campaign targeting Iraqi troops in both Iraq and Kuwait.

In Desert Storm, the 100-hour ground war ended as Allied troops entered Kuwait just four days after launching their offensive against Saddam Hussein's Iraqi forces. 🔆



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




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MEET YOUR NEIGHBORS COMMUNITY

And that list is only a fragment of the new words and phrases first seen in print 77 years ago.



VALENTINE HEART-SHAPED SUGAR COOKIES

February means Valentine's Day and for the Recipe Exchange that means Evie Schild-Hart's Valentine heart-shaped sugar cookies.

You'll recall that Evie and her dark chocolate mocha cream cake were featured on the cover of the March 2023 issue of the Solera Star. Several months later I casually asked her if she made sugar cookies and she said. "Oh yes," and said she uses a recipe passed down generation to generation from her greatgrandmother, who was born in 1860.

I asked if she'd share that recipe for Valentine's Day 2024 and she has. When the cookies were baked and cooled, Evie had her Rose icing ready, the color very carefully blended from a paste, not from a dollop of squeezebottle coloring. She informed me that the squeeze bottle coloring has too much liquid, but the paste is dense, full of vibrant color, and blends very well.

She dips a toothpick into the paste and adds it to the icing mix and then blends it in with a butter knife or small spatula. More paste can be added via a toothpick until you get the desired shade.

If you have put in too much color, you can blend in more of the uncolored icing.

Now for the fun part!

When we arrived (Larry Edsall was along to take photos), Evie had prepared pastry bags with decorating tips and assigned her sister, Gwen Culp, and Larry and I to help decorate her cookies.

She showed us how to iced the flat top of the heart and then how to hold the pastry bag and decorate the cookie.

Once we became comfortable with our new skills, we took liberty with our creative visions. The result was some strange-looking cookies and a lot of laughter. We went home with wonderful memories and tasty cookies.

Here are a few useful tips when making these or other cookies.

- 1. When trying to smooth out the top of your icing, dip your spreader in a glass of water, shake the excess water off the knife and glide your spreader across the top of the icing until smooth.
 - 2. When adding coloring paste to color your icing, use a fresh toothpick each time. You do not want to put icing debris from a used toothpick into your paste.
 - 3. These cookies freeze beautifully. They can be made ahead and when you or your grandchildren want to decorate, just thaw out the amount needed and have a decorating party.

Note from Nadyne: This sugar cookie is delicious even eaten without icing. On your first bite you'll hear the snap of a well baked cookie. Then you taste the soft butter flavor throughout the body of the cookie as you eat it. It melts on your tongue as you chew. After icing is added, you'll taste the sweetness along with the icing's smooth texture, followed by the butter flavor of the sugar cookie. Oh, so good.

RECIPE EXCHANGE

EVIE'S GREAT-GRANDMOTHER'S SUGAR COOKIES

INGREDIENTS:

1 cup butter (2 sticks)

11/2 cup sugar

3/4 cup thick sour milk (1/4 cup vinegar & 1/2 cup milk)

1/2 tsp baking soda

1 tsp vanilla

3 cups flour

2 tsp baking powder

PREP:

Put baking soda in sour milk to dissolve, add other ingredients.

Mix by hand or electric mixer.

Roll out half the dough at a time. Roll your dough to about 1/2 inch thick, sprinkle with sugar. With your rolling pin roll lightly over the dough one time so the sugar will adhere to the dough.

Cut with a glass. Today we use cookie cutters.

Bake at 400 degrees about 10 minutes.

Yields 2 dozen for the large Valentine heart cookie cutter used.

Depending on the size and shape of your cookie cutter the amount will vary.

Excellent recipe to use to cut out Christmas cookies and decorate.

EVIE'S ROSE ICING

INGREDIENTS:

1 large egg white

2/3 cup white shortening (Crisco preferred not lard)

1 Tbsp butter

1 lb sifted powder sugar (a must)

1 tsp flavoring (your choice)

PREP:

Blend egg white, shortening, butter, flavoring a little at a time with mixer. Add the powder sugar. Beat until well blended. This icing will be quite stiff after setting up. 🔆
