We in the ARC decided to write an article on what would really help us to help you in your upgrades to your properties.


We receive applications from residents every month, but we don't always have enough information. Here's how you can help us:

Every homeowner in Solera should have and should read the Architectural Guidelines for the project that the homeowner wants to complete. If you don't have a copy of the Guidelines or you have questions, the following information is available on the community Website: soleraatanthem.connectresident.com or go to our beautiful clubhouse and talk to one of the management service team members.

One of the most common problems is that we don't have a proper plan view of your property and the project plan with the dimensions that we need.

So, here is an example of a proper plan view. In this project, the home owners wants to put a concrete slab with a flag pole in their backyard. It is important to read the Architectural Design Guidelines so that you know you are doing it right. Ultimately, the homeowner is responsible for doing th project correctly.



LIFESTYLE...

BY THE LIFESTYLE COMMITTEE


Editor's note: This is the second in a series of reports outlining the work of the various standing committees of the Solera at Anthem community.



The Lifestyle Committee is one of the standing committees appointed by the Board of Directors of Solera at Anthem. Members are appointed for two-year terms and assist the Lifestyle Director by recommending, planning, and producing activities for Solera residents. The committee receives an annual budget from the community association to fund these efforts.

Our committee members are: Pam D'Assis (chairperson), Debbie Waskowitz (vice chairperson), John Miller (secretary), plus Lea Mills, Susan Newman and Gloria Zimny (committee members) and Gloria Street and Lorraine Barcia (alternates).

We assist Solera's Lifestyle Director, Dominique Jordan-Qaraja.





The Lifestyle Committee develops a month-by-month list of potential activities that fall into four major categories:

- Primary events at the Solera Center: Such activities include dances — Valentines Day, St. Paddy's Day, Halloween, and Christmas Dance (when we're visited by Santa and his Elf). We also stage a few different dance events including Disco Night, Karaoke Night, Spring Fling, Jazz Night and Under the Stars (the latter two held outside on the clubhouse courtyard). and we cannot forget our monthly Bingo Night. Bingo is a big hit, averaging at least 100 residents in attendance.
- · Travel events: These activities are more limited because of ticket and transportation costs. Staying within the committee's budget and determining a fair pricing for these events requires more planning and an analysis of the potential interest by community residents. Past events include Fly over Las Vegas, Town Square for a Lunch & Shop, Smith Center to see the Nutcracker, Eldorado Mine Tour, Westgate to see the Soul of Motown, Fremont Experience, Mandalay Bay Shark Reef Aquarium, Spring Mountain Super Summer Theatre, Glittering Lights Santa Tram. We also do sports events — a favorite among our residents. Some of the recent sporting events include the Aviators, Henderson Silver Knights, Las Vegas Aces and UNLV football.
- No-cost events: At the present time the committee has several scheduled events in this category and is always looking for more. We have daytime seminars presented by a variety of businesses and service agencies. We have our annual shredding and e/waste event, Health Fair (with

- over 30 vendors in attendance), (in June) New Residents Orientation where our new residents can come and explore all we have to offer. We recently added Coffee & Donut Day, inviting people in our community - such as the Henderson Police Department — to come and join us.
- Special annual events: We also have our annual events that are very popular with our residents. They include the Parking Lot Sale. It's like having a garage sale without the hassle. We invite people from all the surrounding areas to come to see all the great things our residents are selling. We have our annual Derby Day. Horse racing is a big hit with our residents. Not to be forgotten is our 4th of July BBQ. We not only serve hot dogs and hamburgers but also great entertainment. Our committee worked very hard on this event. We have our annual Solera Day in November. This event includes a Car Show, Craft Show and Bake Sale (put on by the Women's Club), outside entertainment and — of course — our Hot Dog Lunch. This past year we celebrated the 20th Anniversary of Solera. We had a luau themed event with outstanding entertainment. This event took six months of planning.

The Lifestyle Committee holds its regular meeting on the third Tuesday of each month, but also has additional workshop sessions in between. We all work very hard on all our events. It takes a lot of planning to bring these wonderful events to our community. We do these all for you. 🐇



LET'S TALK TRASH

So, are you up to a little trash talking?

No, I don't mean about people. I mean actual trash. As in what are the rules and regulations concerning garbage cans? – inquiring minds want to know.

In checking Solera's Quick Reference Guide, I learned that "cans are to be placed out by the curb on Monday after 5 pm for pickup. The cans are to be returned to your storage area by Wednesday at 5 am. Trash cans must be kept at least 3 feet away from any fire hydrants when left out for pickup."





As an aside, the Quick Reference Guide is a nifty reference tool for all residents. If you haven't seen or read it, you can obtain a copy on the Solera Athem Community Association website (www.soleranews.com). Just click on the Information Tab at the top and then Helpful Links.

Under Helpful Links, there is a listing of various documents, such as a printable map of the Solera Community; Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions that pertain to the Solera Community; Community Rules and Regulations; Quick Reference Guide and more – all pertaining to life here in Solera.

What else did I learn while snooping around the trash?

Trash cans need to be kept in good condition and cannot be stored in the front yard or where they are visible from the street. The same is true of any bulk trash items. Unless you have an approved trash container (see Architectural Design Guidelines for more details — also available under Helpful Links), trash cans and bulk items should be stored in your garage. If you are unsure, check the Community Calendar in the *Solera Star* for bulk trash days.


We are accepting applications for pet fosters. If you apply

Pete Petit was born in Liverpool, England, and lived there till age four. (Anyone else you've heard of that hails from Liverpool?)



PERVIN GUPTA'S LIFE IS FULL, AND VERY BUSY BY TOM GORMAN



What diversity we enjoy within Solera — a community filled mostly with retirees who are kicking back to one degree or another and wondering what to do next with their lives.

And then there's Solera resident Pervin Gupta, who knows how to stay occupied because her plate is full enough already. Among her talents, she recently was awarded the Ms. Senior India Universe 2023 trophy in her first such pageant. Furthermore, the 55-year-old is a registered behavioral specialist for children burdened by autism.

Pervin's other talents are harder to rank. She runs marathons, dances, speaks two languages, earned a Master of Science in Special Education and Rehabilitation — with a certificate in mediation, and has served as a court-appointed special advocate for children, due to her ability to work with autistic children.

"I just absolutely love it because I can help those kids," she reflects. "Like the 6-year-old girl who was very violent. But she and I have a great connection and she doesn't become violent with me at all.

"I love giving myself to others," Pervin says. "I will give my life for a stranger on the street. I just have love in my 752 trillion cells. I don't have a mean bone in my body. I love all people — black, white, Chinese, Mexican, Indians, Asians." She paused and added, "I have all kinds of friends."

Our neighbor's story begins in India where, when she turned 20 years old, she was married to a man by her parents' arrangement. The couple came to the United States and by the time she was 30, they had two daughters. The couple's marriage turned sour and she raised the girls as a single mom. Today, one of the girls is a neurologist and the other has

two master's degrees — in business administration and in hospital administration. One daughter lives in Arizona, the other in California.

"I'm in the middle,"
Pervin smiles. "And
being single gives
me freedom and
makes me a stronger person because I have to
deal with problems
and think of solutions alone." But after
a pause, she adds, "I
wish I had a handyman."







Pervin earned her master's degree in special education and vocational rehabilitation from Utah State University. Since then, she has worked 23 years with the federal Job Corps program.

"I don't remember how many kids I worked with," she says. "But it was really rewarding — helping them. Isn't that something? Me helping American kids get jobs!"

But for Pervin, her's was a rough row to hoe to get where she is today. She had been raised in the slums of India where, at an early age, she was forced into an arranged marriage. She was the sole parent in raising two daughters while learning a second language and, at University of Utah, earning an advanced degree. With that background, she served as a court-appointed special advocate for children.

To relieve stress, Pervin took up dancing and, at 55 years old, started running marathons.

As for living in Solera, the name "sounds like a resort to me," Pervin says. "It's peaceful, quiet, and after I moved here I found out people are wonderful, too! People are just great! And there's no snow. That's the biggest plus. I just don't like snow."

> "Am I happy? Oh, yes! I'm not going anvwhere!"

And after a pause: "I wish I could get somebody but it hasn't happened. We will see. But I'm very content, very comfortable. I can jump 24 hours with happiness. There is peace in my heart. I'm fine alone, I'm fine with people.

"And there's no snow. That's the biggest plus. I just don't like snow." 🐇

CONCERNED ABOUT COYOTES?

NEVADA DEPARTMENT OF WILDLIFE PROVIDES KEYS TO 'LIVING WITH COYOTES'

"The coyote," as Mark Twain spelled the creature's name in 1872 in his book, Roughing It, "is a long, slim, sick and sorry-looking skeleton, with a gray wolf-skin stretches over it... despairing expression of forsakenness, and misery... He is always hungry. He is always poor, out of luck and friendless."

And for those of us living on the western slope of Black Mountain, coyotes are our neighbors and frequent visitors to our Solera community. But how should we treat these neighbors? Should we fear them? The Nevada Department of Wildlife offers guidance on its website, www.ndow.org:

Coyotes are a common sight throughout Nevada, even our biggest cities have coyotes living inside our neighborhoods. We provide some pretty awesome resources for coyotes in the form of food, water and shelter! If you think about your backyard...

are there rodents or places for rodents to hide? Do you feed birds? Are rabbits a common occurrence in your yard? Do you have pet food or water dishes? All of these can attract coyotes into the area. So, how can we live with coyotes in the area?

HOW DO I KEEP A COYOTE AWAY FROM MY YARD?

Coyotes can often find their way into our neighborhoods and even our backyards, there are some ways you can help to discourage them from being in the area.

 Remove anything that might be attracting the coyotes or their food sources such as rodents.

 Birdseed, pet food, trash or compost, water features, fallen fruit, excess shrubs, woodpiles, decks, or other structures that can provide cover or a place to den.

• Install devices to scare away the coyotes.

 Fence in your yard with a fence that is over 6ft tall. You can also add "coyote rollers" to the top of the fence. Coyotes can jump fences that are seven feet tall, so a fence alone will not suffice.

 Never allow a coyote to become comfortable around your home, every time you see a coyote scare it away!



I'M WORRIED ABOUT MY PETS. WHAT SHOULD I DO?

A lot of us have pets for whom we would do anything. Making sure to secure your pets properly helps to ensure their safety.

Dog owners -

- Supervise your dog when it is outside, especially around dawn and dusk. If you must leave your dog outside, make sure you leave it in a fully enclosed dog run that has a roof.
- When walking your dog, always keep it on a six feet leash. Avoid using extendable leashes because this limits the control you have over your pet.
- Do not allow your dog to interact with coyotes!
 Never allow your dog to chase or follow coyotes for any reason.

Cat owners -

 The only way to ensure your cat's safety is to keep them indoors or in an outdoor cat enclosure that is secure. This not only keeps your cat in, but other animals out.

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I SEE A COYOTE IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD?

Because they are so common, a lot of us will see a coyote in a neighborhood at one point or another. Whenever a coyote is seen in an urban area, the best thing you can do for them, and us, is to haze it away. This means:

- Standing your ground, *never* run from the coyote.
- · Get big, loud and scary!
- Wave your hands around and yell at the coyote.
- If the animal stops and looks back, make sure to continue scaring the coyote away until they have completely left the area.
- Never corner a coyote, always make sure they have a way to escape.

Hazing is important because it helps to ensure coyotes maintain a fear of humans. When they become habituated to humans (lose their fear) they are more likely to become bold and be less likely to run away from people when they are seen.

I AM WORRIED ABOUT MY SAFETY, WILL A COYOTE ATTACK ME?

Statistically, champagne corks and golf balls are far more dangerous to humans than coyotes. By taking the above precautions you will help limit conflicts that may arise in your neighborhood. If an incident with a human does occur, please call 911 or our dispatch 775-688-1331 immediately.



WILL THE DEPARTMENT COME AND REMOVE/ RELOCATE THE COYOTES IN MY NEIGHBORHOOD?

In short, removal of coyotes is not a long-term solution. If there is habitat in your neighborhood, coyotes will be in the area. Even if every single coyote was removed, more would quickly come into the area (who doesn't want to live near a nice golf course?).

Coyotes are very territorial and dependent on their home ranges. After being relocated, they will do just about anything to get back home where they are familiar with the resources (this includes crossing roadways, exposure to elements, lack of food and water) — this is both dangerous for the animal, and counter-effective for the neighborhood. If they stay, the new, unfamiliar territory is almost guaranteed to be a currently occupied territory for other foxes or coyotes, who will aggressively and fatally defend against intruders. The best, and most effective way of keeping coyotes out of our neighborhoods is to keep the resources low (reduce attractants) and the threats high (haze).

If there is a significant public safety risk, please reach out to us. However, we do not remove coyotes for being sighted in neighborhoods or attacking free-roaming cats and dogs. With that in mind, please make sure to secure your pets and haze away coyotes when seen. *

SEARCHING FOR A DAY TRIP?

EXPLORE THE HISTORY OF SEARCHLIGHT

What do Hollywood actors Rex Bell and Clara Bow, fashion designer Edith Head, aviators William Nellis and John Macready, businessman James "Big Jim" Cashman, entertainer Rags M'Goo, and music composer Scott Joplin have in common with the late U.S. Senator Harry Reid?

Each was either born in, raised in, resided in (or nearby) or wrote in tribute to Searchlight, Nevada.

Each also is featured in the Searchlight Museum, which joins the Cannon Aviation Museum (see January 2024 *Solera Star*) and the main Clark County Museum on Boulder Highway (see July 2023 *Solera Star*) to comprise the county's historical museum footprint.


The Searchlight branch fills a room inside the Searchlight Community Center, located some 60 miles south of Solera and east of Highway 95 on Cottonwood Cove Road (Nevada 164).

By the way, if you're wondering how Searchlight got its name, there seems no definitive answer. According to local lore, it was either in a conversation between mining partners Gus Moore and G.F. Colton and Colton's use of a Search Light brand match to light his pipe, or that one night Colton was atop a tall hill, lit a match and saw gold at his feet, or he said the spot would be an ideal location in the










Mining made Searchlight so significant that when Nevada's Lincoln County was to be split in 1907, Searchlight, with twice as many registered voters as Las Vegas, was considered for the new Clark County seat. However, the process to split the county wasn't consummated until two years later and, by then, Las Vegas had the larger population.

If you want to explore beyond the museum on your day trip, you can continue east to Cottonwood Cove and the Lake Mohave section of the Colorado River. Or go back across Highway 95 and go west on scenic Nipton Road. Along the way is Walking Box ranch, the home of Rex Bell and Clara Bow. Just before you reach Interstate 15, you pass through fascinating town of Nipton (see June 2021 and April 2023 issues Solera Star). ※










SCOTT JOPLIN AND THE SEARCHLIGHT RAG

In 1907, Scott Joplin, America's foremost composer of ragtime music, wrote the SEARCHLIGHT RAG as a tribute to his friends Charles and Tom Turpin. The Turpin brothers had an interest in the Bio Onion Mire in 1901 peer what were interest in the Big Onion Mine in 1891 near what was to become Searchlight. They did not stay long in Nevada and returned home to St. Louis. The SEARCHLIGHT RAG was an apparent tribute to that experience.

Joplin was very particular about how the rag was played. His directions were exacting, "NOTICE Do not play this piece fast. It is never right to play ragtime fast. COMPOSER."

Scott Joplin died in 1917.



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SOLERA ROMEO'S AREN'T WHAT YOU MIGHT EXPECT

THEY AREN'T CHASING WOMEN, BUT ARE DOING GOOD BY FRANK NOBEL

When you learn that Solera has a club called the Romeo's, you can be forgiven if your first thought is along the lines of "what about Juliet?"

But this group isn't based on Shakespeare's famous play. ROMEO in this case is an abbreviation for "Retired Old Men Eating Out."

The club was established in January 2008 and meets for breakfast the third Friday of each month.

"We've been everywhere," notes Ken Pavese, the Romeo's founding treasurer.

At first, the club would meet at the Solera clubhouse and decide on locations for breakfast. Destinations included the Omelet House, Railroad Pass, and Arizona Charlie's, to name just a few. Other locations have included the buffet at Green Valley Ranch and the Village Pub on Eastern Avenue.

Ken recalls that at Village Pub, a waitress named Leslie knew each member's usual order even before they could remember what they wanted to order.

The club's current breakfast place is the buffet at the South Point Casino.

Eating out aside, the Romeo's history is that of service. The group was founded to provide support for our troops in Afghanistan, and some 50 boxes of basic essentials were collected for servicemen and women, the local Elks Lodge handling the cost of shipping.



The Romeo's also started Solera's bingo games, hot dog lunches, pancake breakfasts and a New Year's Eve party. They staged the first road trip to Tuacahn, the art and entertainment venue in St. George, Utah. Currently, the Romeo's support the country breakfast and the Big Game (Super Bowl) party.

Even with 14 months missed during the Covid-19 epidemic, the March 2024 breakfast marks the 179th for the group, which collects nominal annual dues toward its support of charities.

Interested in becoming one of Solera's Retired Old Men Eating Out? Just show up the third Friday of the month at the South Point Casino buffet at 8:30 a.m. Look for Ken; he's the Romeo counting the money and he'll gladly sign you up. 🔆







Nestled between Cactus Joe's Blue Diamond Nursery and the Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area is Blue Diamond, a census-designated place in Nevada.

As you drive toward Red Rock Canyon on Blue Diamond Road, you may notice an outgrowth of trees on your left: that's the community of Blue Diamond, and there is a bit of history attached to that locale.

The area was named when the Blue Diamond Company took ownership of the gypsum mine located there. Prior to that, the village had been known as Cottonwood Springs: and because of the springs it became a location on the famed Old Spanish Trail, that went from Southern California to Santa Fe by way of territory that would become Nevada, Utah, Colorado, and New Mexico.

Currently, Blue Diamond is home to a population of around 300 people. It has a library, elementary school, and a park. In the park you will often see wild burros grazing on the grass. A drive through the community doesn't take but a hot minute unless, of course, you stop to refuel at the gas station.

But there is a destination to consider for your trip to the community — the Cottonwood Station. The saloon and restaurant may be new, but it also is quaint with decorations, photos, and good food and service.

Blue Diamond is an interesting side trip as you head to Red Rock Canyon, or even a destination for a roundtrip of about 50 miles.

I saw a headline a few weeks ago. It reported that "Solera lays off staff..."

Fear not, Solera at Anthem residents, our FirstService Residential management team is still on the job for us. Turns out the headline referred to a different Solera, in this case Solera Holdings Inc., a Texasbased software company and provider of services to the automotive and property insurance industries.

Which got me to wondering: How many celestial bodies might there be in the larger Solera solar system?

Obviously, there's Solera at Anthem, where some 3,000 of us live and play. We were created by the Del Webb home development company, which was so happy with us that it shared our name with several other of 55-and-older housing arrays, including those in California, Florida, Arizona, New Mexico, and even locally over at Stallion Mountain.

There also is Solera Senior Living, a company based in Denver that operates senior citizen apartment communities there as well as in Clearwater, Florida; Evanston, Illinois; Austin, Texas; Williamsburg, Virginia; Reston, Virginia; and even here in Las Vegas, where the company's Lumina facility is on West Charleston Boulevard.

But wait, there's more.

The Solera National Bank is located in Lakewood, Colorado, so not all that far from Solera, an apartment building in downtown Denver. The Colorado community of Lone Tree is the home of Solera Salon Suites, of which there are five such facilities where you and your guests can be pampered.

There's another Solera, this one a risk management company in Roseville, California. Meanwhile, Solera also is the name of a "full band dynamics processor" produced for audio specialists by Flux, a French software engineering company.

Oh, and there's Solera, a brand of fabrics from marine and automotive manufacturer Lippert for use in awnings for recreational vehicles, and Solera, a line of RV models produced by Forest River of Elkhart, Indiana.

Solera also is the name of shower shampoo, conditioner and body wash products made in Canada, which are not to be confused with the fungicides. herbicides and insecticides from Yuma, Arizona-based Solera.

My Google search also revealed Solera, a Spanish-themed restaurant and tapas bar in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. By the way, Solera is a fitting name for such an establishment because while our name sounds like something related to the solar system, solera actually is a Spanish word that describes the process for producing sherry wine, and

apparently the process has been adapted to the making of rum, brandy, whiskey, balsamic sherry vinegars, as well as beer.

SOLERA

By whatever means, the Solera Brewery in Parkdale, Oregon, brews beers in small batches and serves them in a "public house experience" that also offers soup, sandwiches and what it calls "a HUGE burrito." There's American Solera, a craft brewery and tap room with locations in Tulsa and Edmonds, Oklahoma, and also the Bull City Solera and Taproom in Durham, North Carolina.

If beer isn't your beverage of choice, you might consider Solera, a single malt whisky from Australian distiller Starward, or Solera Rum, produced by the likes of Hilton Head Distillery, Santa Teresa, Bacardi and perhaps others.

Prefer wine? St. Julian of Paw Paw, Michigan, offers Solera cream sherry, and the Tasting Room of Huntly, Virginia, promotes Solera NV, a Rappahan-

Rosellen was one of my mother's best and longest friends. Mom lived to 101 and Rosellen to 98. Through many decades they shared their faith and their commitment to schools and their students. Their families became close, living not far apart while working in Illinois, enjoying recreation in cottages on a lake in Indiana, and in retirement living in residences a few miles apart in Florida.

Pot luck dinners were held at church and in homes, and Rosellen prepared her beans as a side dish for such events. I've moved them from a large casserole baking in the oven to a stew- or chili-style main meal cooked in the crock pot/slow cooker.

Here is the original recipe, as Rosellen gave it to Mom, and she to me:

- Brown a half-pound each of bacon and hamburger and a 1/2-cup of chopped onions.
- Add a 1/2 cup of ketchup, a 3/4 cup of brown sugar, and 1 teaspoon each of salt and mustard.
- Add a can of kidney beans, a can of pork 'n beans and a can of lima beans.
- Bake for 2 hours at 350 degrees in the oven.

Here is my modified recipe for cooking in the crock pot (you probably could save time by browning the meat on the stove top, but I do everything in the crock pot, thus there's only one pot to clean, and while it takes a few hours for everything to cook, I love the way the house smells during the process):

- Brown the meat (I tend to use two 16-ounce rolls of ground pork sausage, one regular and one spicy).
- Add at least a 1/2 cup of finely chopped onion, a little less than a cup of ketchup and an equal amount (or even slightly more) of mustard, a cup (or maybe a smidge more) of brown sugar, and 1 teaspoon of salt.
- · Next, add 5 cans of beans (I don't like lima beans, and there's more room in a crock pot than in a casserole baking dish, so I do 2 cans of black beans, 1 of Northern or white beans, 1 of kidney beans, and 1 of Navy beans, including the liquid that's in those cans).
- Add 2 bay leaves (but remember to remove them before serving) and cook in the crock pot on low for several hours, enjoying the way your kitchen smells as you anticipate the evening meal.

The result is what I find to be a tasty stew- or chili-like meal. I top my bowl with crumbled saltine crackers or, for a special taste treat, croutons (regular or flavored). I suppose shredded cheese also would work as a topping, and my son-in-law likely would add a dollop of sour cream.

After enjoying a big bowl for dinner, I'll distribute the rest of the meat-and-bean dish into plastic containers (I like Ziploc's snap-top 3 1/8 cup size. I find each is large enough for two more servings). I'll put a couple of those containers in the refrigerator to eat within the next few days, and I'll put others in the freezer to enjoy later in the month.
